As part of our goal to help people feel a sense of belonging in their communities, TD is proud to support arts and culture events, initiatives and organizations that amplify diverse voices — like the Kingston Canadian Film Festival.

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Twenty-four years of show biz are in the books and we're ready to celebrate the 25th! On the eve of our big anniversary, we asked our audience: what's your most unforgettable Festival moment? The massive collection of responses could easily fill a book. As expected, visits from the legendary Allan King and Gordon Pinsent are top picks, as are appearances from Kids in the Hall and Baroness von Sketch (we're stoked for Carolyn Taylor this year). The time that wrestler Jake the Snake Roberts crashed our Tango party is less renowned, yet unforgettable.

A personal all-time favourite moment is from 2014, when our opening night film DRIVING WITH SELVI received a standing ovation without a dry eye in the house. The audience stood and cheered as Director, Elisa Paloschi, walked on stage for the Q&A. Seconds later, the audience roared (and wept!) as the subject of the film, Selvi, made a surprise visit all the way from India. We still reminisce with festival-goers about that unforgettable night. Nowadays, staff refer to big Festival surprises as "Selvi moments."

My first moment? As a patron in 2004, way before Jake the Snake, the Fest invited band Fatal Warsnake to warm up the audience before a late-night film. As the thrash trio ripped through a three-song set, the likelihood of a noise complaint was high. More impressive than their 15-minute set was the five-minute load-out, Marshall stacks and all. Warsnake's 80's Dodge Ram hauled down Princess as City Bylaw arrived to a hushed audience sitting through the quiet, gentle Quebecois feature about a remote fishing village.

As we celebrate our 25th anniversary this year, please keep sending us your Festival moments! The KCFF story stems from such an amazing community: volunteers, staff, board, filmmakers and industry, sponsors, donors and YOU, our dedicated audience. I'm grateful to be part of this community — thank you all! Here's to the next 25 years of unforgettable Selvi moments (and Jake the Snake ones too) and the next chapter of our Festival story.

When I was 25, I had left the country for a couple of years, to study film in the Chicago area, where I regularly had to reaffirm for my American friends that Canadian cinema did in fact exist. They might have been aware of David Cronenberg, but not much more. At that time, to be fair, the turning-point pictures *Mon oncle Antoine* and *Goin' Down the Road* were barely ten years old. Classics to be, such as *The Grey Fox* and *I've Heard the Mermaids Singing*, remained years from release and acclaim, in Canada and elsewhere.

By the time the Kingston Canadian Film Festival launched, on a cold, clear 3rd of March, 2001, cinema in Canada had gone through booms, busts and echoes. KCFF captured the changes and generations, with a brace of 17 new feature films: by veteran writer-director Denys Arcand (*Stardom*); by younger and mid-career artists including Robert Lepage (*Possible Worlds*) and Gary Burns (*Waydowntown*); and early films by young filmmakers, such as *Maelstrom*, the second feature by phenom Denis Villeneuve. (What ever happened to him? He was going somewhere).

Over the past 24 festivals, we've shown several hundred new feature films and even more shorts, as well as a selection from the historical past of Canadian cinema — which does exist! And we've built an enviable community of festival staff and volunteers, past and present, filmmakers and guests, sponsors and supporters, and, needless to say, moviegoers just like you — a community that continues to evolve and grow. Thank you, all of you.

When I was 25, I figured I was just getting started, and the possibilities were endless. Same with the Kingston Canadian Film Festival.

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ABERDEEN

DIRECTOR: RYAN COOPER, EVA THOMAS LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 83 MINUTES



A moving story of hardship and resilience, this drama by directors Ryan Cooper and Eva Thomas is anchored by the powerful performance by Gail Maurice, the Métis actor and filmmaker who festival audiences know for her roles in films like BONES OF CROWS (KCFF23) and for her own directorial debut ROSIE (KCFF23). Maurice stars as Aberdeen, an Indigenous woman who faces daunting challenges as an unhoused person in Winnipeg after being displaced from her community. Thankfully, friends like Alfred (Billy Merasty of STELLAR, KCFF23) and Grace (Jennifer Podemski) provide help and solace as Aberdeen strives to not only piece her life back together but restore long-broken bonds in her family. Exhibiting great fierceness and vulnerability, Maurice helps make ABERDEEN a vital showcase for some of Canada's best acting talent and for two of its most promising new filmmakers.



DIRECTORS: SHANNON WALSH LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 86 MINUTES



For her latest documentary, director Shannon Walsh uses decidedly unconventional means to tell what is surely the grandest love story to be presented at KCFF this year. Mixing music-infused reenactments with eye-popping personal videos filmed during the two subjects' incredible life together, Walsh's film pays tribute to Alan and Adrianne, a couple who transformed their home in rural Illinois into a lavishly decorated castle that continues to stand as a testament to their love of artistic expression and their devotion to each other. Indeed, it's a devotion so intense, it transcends even death. That's why viewers may feel as awed and moved by the utterly unique people at the heart of the film as they are by the one-of-the-kind location that Walsh captures so vividly.



DIRECTOR: DALE HESLIP LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 88 MINUTES



This year we close KCFF with a bang! Jim Cuddy, Greg Keelor and director Dale Heslip will all join us in-person for a guided tour through the history of one of the country's most venerated bands. Heslip's vivid and very enjoyable documentary traces Blue Rodeo's journey from the Queen Street clubs where it all began to the stages they claim as their own four decades later. In between came many peaks and valleys, but those experiences just seemed to make them stronger. That's because the core of Blue Rodeo's music has always been the deep personal and creative bond that was first forged between Jim Cuddy and Greg Keelor back in high school in North Toronto. Both musicians make for candid and compelling interview subjects as they — along with their bandmates and many others who have come along for the ride — share their memories and their songs in a film that will be savoured by longtime fans and newcomers alike.

DIRECTORS: PATRICE SAUVÉ LANGUAGE: FRENCH (WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES) RUNTIME: 105 MINUTES



ACFOM

The nostalgic yet sharp-eyed story of the bond that develops between two very different neighbours, BLUE SKY JO is a richly nuanced adaptation of an award-winning novel by Marie-Renée Lavoie. Juliette Bharucha gives a terrific performance as Hélène, a 10-year-old girl growing up in a working-class corner of Quebec City in the early 1980s. Though the youngster's vivid imagination provides her with an escape, Hélène's perceptive nature means she's well aware of the growing tensions within her family. That's why her connection to Monsieur Roger (Gildor Roy), an elderly grouch who lives nearby, becomes more valuable than either of them could predict. The winner for best French-language feature at Cinéfest and one of Quebec's most warmly received films of the year, director Patrice Sauvé's drama movingly conveys the kindness and solace that we can sometimes find in the people near us, provided we're ready to look for them.



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BONJOUR TRISTESSE

DIRECTOR: DURGA CHEW-BOSE LANGUAGE: FRENCH AND ENGLISH (WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES) RUNTIME: 110 MINUTES



Previously adapted by legendary director Otto Preminger in 1958, Françoise Sagan's classic coming-ofage novel now serves as the inspiration for another very memorable film, namely this perfectly poised debut feature by Montreal-based writer turned filmmaker Durga Chew-Bose. With its spectacular French seaside setting and chic characters, BONJOUR TRISTESSE also rates as one of the most visually sumptuous features at this year's festival. That said, the attractive surfaces here disguise the unrulier and darker energies at work in the story of Cécile (Lily McInerny), a teenager who's unhappy to see her beloved widower father Raymond (Claes Bang) reconnect with his old flame Anne (Chloë Sevigny), prompting her to hatch a scheme that will have unintended consequences. Rich with unspoken desires and other undercurrents of tension, Chew-Bose's adaptation impresses with its cool intelligence and impeccable performances.



DIRECTORS: VARIOUS LANGUAGE: VARIOUS (WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES) RUNTIME: 90 MINUTES

Showcasing some of the best short films from across the country, the CANADIAN SHORTS program sees more submissions than all other categories combined! This program dates back to Year One of the Fest and has featured a who's who of Canadian film, including films from heavyweights like Zacharias Kunuk and Denis Villeneuve. Carefully curated and culled from an incredible range of work from established and emerging storytellers, our 2025 lineup demonstrates the very simple truth that sometimes less is more. All films in this program are automatically considered for our Best Canadian Short Award, presented on March 2 at the KCFF Awards Party! Wealth Management

DIRECTOR: ANN MARIE FLEMING LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 110 MINUTES

MARIN

The director of festival favourites like WINDOW HORSES (KCFF17) and long one of Canadian cinema's most unique talents, Ann Marie Fleming returns with one of her most singular visions yet. This fable presents a possible future in which humankind has been able to move past the challenges and catastrophes that plague our present, albeit with a very grave cost. The teenaged protagonist of Fleming's film, Kiah (Keira Jang) has much to learn when she begins her job as a "Documenter," one who bears witness to the end-of-life ceremonies that are obligatory for citizens who've reached the age of 50. Kiah's new task is further complicated by the knowledge that time's almost up for Kiah's doting mother Ellie, played by the great Sandra Oh. With its introspective tone, smart take on dystopic tropes, and deft grace notes of animation, Fleming's latest marvel is an unusually poignant kind of science-fiction story.



DIRECTOR: GEORGE ASSIMAKOPOULOS LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 90 MINUTES



Returning to KCFF with another very proudly local production, the Branded to Film team promises a movie ride wild and gnarly enough to blow the doors off any grindhouse. Mixing all that is loud and heavy with high tension and gory horror thrills, the tale begins with a hard-rocking band whose imminent breakthrough gets derailed by a messy breakup. Two years later, the four members try to patch things up during a getaway at a cottage in South Frontenac. Unfortunately, they soon discover that their old gripes and resentments are the least of their worries if they hope to survive the weekend. With a cast that includes real-life musicians like Ciara Roberts of Tiny Horse, Jonah Lewis-Anthony of The Wilderness and Hanorah Hanley, George Assimakopoulos's feature combines a sense of raw authenticity about life in a band with an undisguised affection for old-school movie mayhem.

DRIVE BACK HOME

DIRECTOR: MICHAEL CLOWATER LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 100 MINUTES

Inspired by a true story in the family of writer-director Michael Clowater, this poignant yet often very funny film — an audience prizewinner at the Calgary film festival — takes place in a time and place when LGBTQ+ people had precious little opportunity to live their truth. To be more specific, that setting is small-town New Brunswick circa 1970, which is where a grouchy plumber named Weldon (Charlie Creed-Miles) receives a call from the Toronto police to come collect his long-estranged brother Perley (Alan Cumming) lest he face the full consequences of being caught having sex with another man in a public park. What ensues is an uncommonly good-natured kind of road movie as the brothers seek a new understanding of each other, and of the traumatic history they share. The slow-building rapport between Creed-Miles and the always great Cumming is just one of the reasons Clowater's first feature is so endearing and moving.

HUNTING DAZE

LANGUAGE: FRENCH (WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES) RUNTIME: 79 MINUTES



DELTA HOTELS

KINGSTON WATERERO

The bold tale of a hunting trip that goes far off the rails, this whip-smart thriller by Montreal's Annick Blanc rates as one of the most striking and bracing Canadian debut features in recent years. The film's principal power source is Nahéma Ricci, who KCFF audiences will know from her electrifying breakout performance in Sophie Deraspe's ANTIGONE, the Festival's opening night film in 2020. Here she stars as Nina, a sex worker who's none too happy to be stranded in the woods with a group of hunters out for a bachelor party weekend. Though the balance of power soon tips in the favour of the small but steely newcomer, the arrival of another outsider raises the stakes yet further. Gripping, stylish and sometimes surreal, Blanc's film boasts no lack of energy or audacity.

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DIRECTOR: NAOMI OKABE LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 45 MINUTES

FRONTENAC

The winner of the Best Local Short at KCFF23, Kingston/PEC-based filmmaker, writer and artist Naomi Okabe returns to the Fest with another finely nuanced work. A look at the challenges of balancing life and work — and of finding meaning in both — Okabe's new medium-length documentary introduces viewers to six people who have bucked societal preconceptions and challenged gender stereotypes in the ways they've chosen to serve their families and their communities. Delving deep into the lives of subjects who include a beekeeper, an educator, a flower farmer and a cattle breeder. Okabe generously offers viewers a wealth of insights. We are honoured and excited to be screening the world premiere!



DIRECTOR: STEPHEN CHUNG LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 94 MINUTES



Stephen Chung's energetic film gives viewers an insider's view of not just the rise of one of Canada's best-loved bands of the millennium, but also a tectonic shift for Toronto's cultural landscape. Along with present-day interviews of members of Broken Social Scene, Chung revisits candid footage he shot of the musicians as the freewheeling indie-rock collective first began to cohere in a series of homes and clubs in the early 2000s. Of course, none of them knew that the songs they were creating together in such a spirit of joy and camaraderie would soon earn them a worldwide audience. As potent as Chung's film as a celebration of Broken Social Scene and the many other music-makers in their orbit — including Metric, Feist, Stars and Jason Collett — it's just as memorable for how it captures a moment in the life of the city before its own transformation.

DIRECTOR: EVAN BARD LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 90 MINUTES



In this debut feature by Kingston writer-director Evan Bard, a struggling artist named Margo faces a big challenge if she hopes to preserve her wedding plans. First, she has to end the passionate affair she's been having. But when her lover refuses to let go and crashes her engagement dinner, his arrival sets off a chain of events that reveal the long-buried secrets that all of the guests have been trying to hide. Anchored by the compelling lead performance by *Shoresy's* Michala Brasseur, Bard's film is a modern comedy of manners that's remarkable for its fine balance between the dramatic and the comedic, and for the many breakout-worthy performers in its ensemble cast. It also astutely portrays the struggles that exist between dedication and responsibility, between art and life... and between Margo and her muses who, on this fateful evening, are most definitely not amused. This is a world premiere at KCFF25!

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MATT AND MARA

DIRECTOR: KAZ RADWANSKI LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 80 MINUTES

WPBS

While Kazik Radwanski's latest feature sees the Toronto director reunite with the stars of his widely acclaimed ANNE AT 13,000 FEET (KCFF20), his new film's astute blend of comedy and drama makes for a very different but equally engaging viewing experience. Deragh Campbell appears here as Mara, a university professor whose dissatisfactions with her life and career become harder to bear when she reconnects with Matt, a writer and old friend played by Matt Johnson, the star and maker of past fest faves like OPERATION AVALANCHE (KCFF17). A sly, subtle, yet sympathetic study of a woman wrestling with conflicting desires and a pile-up of uncertainties, Radwanski's fourth feature extends great warmth toward its characters despite (or maybe because of) their willingness to mess up their lives.



DIRECTOR: KIM O'BOMSAWIN LANGUAGE: FRENCH, ENGLISH, INNU-AIMUN, ATIKAMEKW (WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES) RUNTIME: 93 MINUTES



In the latest by Abenaki director Kim O'Bomsawin — who was last at the festival with CALL ME HUMAN (KCFF21) — members of a new generation take the opportunity to share their experiences, hopes, and dreams in a way that won't soon be forgotten. In a process that lasted over six years, O'Bomsawin visited groups of children in three different indigenous nations — Atikamekw, Eeyou Cree and Innu — and delved deep into their daily lives. Capturing her subjects' journeys toward adulthood with great care and sensitivity, this recent prizewinner at VIFF and RIDM serves as an insightful and inspiring portrait of indigenous youth, one that acknowledges the challenges they face while celebrating the hope, joy and beauty they exude.

NO DRESS REHEARSA BEHIND THE SCIENCES

DIRECTOR: MIKE DOWNIE LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 60 MINUTES

HOMESTEAD

One of the past year's biggest television events — and certainly its most resoundingly Kingstonian! — THE TRAGICALLY HIP: NO DRESS REHEARSAL rocked viewers worldwide with its candid and comprehensive look at the band that changed the game for Canadian music. Even at four hours long it left us wanting more, which is why KCFF is thrilled to host director Mike Downie and producer and editor Peter Denes as they share stories about the making of their award-winning documentary. Along with never-aired outtakes and other unseen footage, the screening includes a rare big-screen presentation of some of the Hip's most iconic music videos. And yes, we'll make sure we play it all good and loud.



DIRECTOR: SOOK-YIN LEE LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 85 MINUTES



Even in the wildly varied career she's led in this country's overlapping worlds of film, television, music and art since she first made her mark in Vancouver's music scene in the '80s, Sook-Yin Lee has never done something quite as unique — or as uniquely personal — as her third feature. In adapting the 2011 graphic novel by her former romantic partner Chester Brown, she puts her stamp on an eventful period in her history during the 1990s. Unhappy with her work as a VJ for a music-video station much like MuchMusic (for whom Lee was indeed a very public face), the director's fictional alter ego Sonny (Emily Lê) pursues new romantic connections even as she hopes to sustain her current one. Meanwhile, Chester (Daniel Beirne) conducts an odyssey of his own through his encounters with sex workers, a journey that elicits provocative questions about labour, freedom and desire. Funny, daring and astute, Lee's film maintains a playful sense of humour even as it lays bare potentially discomfiting truths about the things we want and how we go about getting them.

SHARP CORNER

DIRECTOR: JASON BUXTON LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 111 MINUTES



Fueled by a quietly intense lead performance by acclaimed American actor Ben Foster, this second feature by Nova Scotia-based director Jason Buxton is a gripping portrait of a man cracking under pressures both external and internal. Based on a short story by Winnipeg writer Russell Wangersky, the drama stars Foster as Josh McCall, a family man who discovers that a tight curve on the road outside his new home has an alarming tendency to cause grisly car accidents. The family's proximity to trauma takes an increasing toll on Josh's relationship with his wife Rachel (Cobie Smulders) and his mental state. More than matching the expectations the filmmaker raised with his 2013 award-winner BLACKBIRD, Buxton's skillful second feature succeeds both as perceptive character study and steely psychological thriller.

SO SURREAL: BEHIND THE MASKS

DIRECTOR: NEIL DIAMOND, JOANNE ROBERTSON LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 88 MINUTES



One of the most influential movements in the history of 20th-century art, surrealism was itself strongly influenced by Indigenous artists, creators and craftspeople who never gained the fame accorded to Max Ernst and Joan Miró. Directors Neil Diamond and Joanne Robertson make it their mission to uncover the connections between the work of surrealist artists and the Kwakwaka'wakw and Yup'ik ceremonial masks that ended up in studios, museums and collections far from their points of origin. But what might've been a dry lesson in art history becomes a lively, playful and thought-provoking documentary about the fascinating journeys that these masks wended through the art world and the contemporary efforts to return them to their rightful homes.

Needless to say, the intensity of this obsession may not benefit anyone in this household, whether human or animal. With elements like Matt Johnson's cameo further heightening the absurdity at hand, Petrie's feature debut makes for a bracing and very memorable study of partners under extreme duress.

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DIRECTOR: SIMON ENNIS LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 88 MINUTES

A big-hearted testament to the meaning we find in supposedly meaningless pursuits, this documentary brings viewers into a remarkable community of people who share a deep and abiding devotion to board games. With subjects that include an erudite games historian, several aspiring designers and the many fierce competitors at the World Series of Board Games in Las Vegas, THE HOBBY presents this bustling subculture from a variety of perspectives, emphasizing the diversity that exists within it. Even better is the joyful and endlessly curious spirit that suffuses this effort by Simon Ennis, a filmmaker who was last at the Festival with LUNARCY! (KCFF13), a look at some of the moon's biggest fans. His latest expresses just as much affection for all the proud games nerds on screen.



DIRECTOR: MARYSE LEGAGNEUR LANGUAGE: FRENCH, ENGLISH (WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES) RUNTIME: 111 MINUTES



A powerful story of the traumas suffered by Haitians during the Duvalier regime and their long-lasting effects on families, this drama marks a confident shift to feature filmmaking by documentarian Maryse Legagneur. Gilbert Laumord stars as Reynold, a Montreal man with terminal stomach cancer. Before he goes, he has a chance to repair his relationship with Vanessa (Marie-Evelyne Lessard), his long-estranged daughter. Retold as he eats his daughter's efforts to replicate his favourite meals from back home, Reynold's stories of his experiences in Haiti — including his brutal incarceration — become Vanessa's own opportunity to understand the impact they had on her father. The grand prize winner at the Quebec City Film Festival, Legagneur's film brings a dark chapter in history into the light with great courage and sensitivity.



DIRECTOR: JOHNNY MA LANGUAGE: ENGLISH, KOREAN (WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES) RUNTIME: 100 MINUTES



Mixing moments of melancholy, poignancy and humour, the latest by writer-director Johnny Ma takes a highly original approach to his film's themes of cultural dislocation and familial relations. After her adult daughter sustains an injury on an icy Winnipeg street that puts her in a coma, Sara (Kim Ho-jung) comes from South Korea to be at her bedside in hospital. Yet even amid this stressful situation, Sara can't help herself from meddling in her daughter's life, a life that she may not know much about at all. Trading in the harder tone of his startling feature debut OLD STONE (KCFF17) for warmer ones that shift from the naturalistic to the wildly surreal, Ma presents a story about family and community that takes many farcical turns yet remains all too relatable.



DIRECTOR: MATTHEW RANKIN LANGUAGE: PERSIAN, FRENCH (WITH ENGLISH SUBTITLES) RUNTIME: 89 MINUTES



Matthew Rankin's weird and wonderful imagination has served him well in his many inventive shorts and in his first feature THE TWENTIETH CENTURY (KCFF20), but the Winnipeg-bred, Montreal-based filmmaker reaches a new plateau of awe-inspiring oddness with his extraordinary second feature. An absurdist tragicomedy with a series of interconnected tales, it's set in an alternate universe but still plenty wintry version of Winnipeg in which the Iranian-Canadian community predominates, such that Farsi and French are Canada's two official languages. The preponderance of turkeys and Kleenex repositories is one of many further whimsical details. Yet however strange Rankin's tactics may seem, he also tells a moving story about the search for home and human connection. Canada's most recent submission for the best international feature at the Academy Awards, it is also one of the year's most acclaimed films, winning major prizes at the Toronto, Vancouver and Melbourne festivals.



DIRECTOR: KAREN CHAPMAN LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 83 MINUTES

PLAYBACK

Living with her teenage children and her own mother in a too-small Scarborough apartment, a woman seeks to break free of generational cycles of family violence and trauma in this beautifully realized debut feature by Toronto's Karen Chapman. Olunike Adeliyi gives a vivid performance as Beverly-Jean, a widow whose behavior suggests she has experienced violence but dares not speak about it. Yet when she comes to see the trouble that it causes her kids, she begins a process of healing that will affect everyone around her. Both poignant and perceptive as a story about the effects of violence, Chapman's drama extends such care and empathy to its characters that viewers will feel like they're part of the same warm embrace.



DIRECTOR: JOSE AVELINO GILLES CORBETT LOURENÇC LANGUAGE: ENGLISH RUNTIME: 101 MINUTES



In transforming Goethe's 18th-century novella about a doomed love affair into the stuff of a stylish, snappy, and very modern rom-com, José Avelino Gilles Corbett Lourenço performs what surely qualifies as a magic trick. The charms of the Toronto-based filmmaker and writer's debut feature are greatly enhanced by the efforts of an exemplary cast led by British actor Douglas Booth and Canada's own Alison Pill (ALL MY PUNY SORROWS, KCFF22). Booth plays Werther, a literary-minded young man who sees his chance for a grand romance when he meets Charlotte (Pill). Perceiving her engagement to Albert (Patrick J. Adams of *Suits*) as an obstacle to be overcome, Werther pursues his campaign without fully realizing the costs of his actions until too late. But rather than descend into Goethe's gloom, Lourenço aims for a very different direction with his reinterpretation, which is as delightful as it is unpredictable.

From its opening in 1971 to its recent closure as part of a controversial redevelopment plan, Ontario Place always meant something more than just a series of parks, venues and one big dome at Toronto's lakeside. Through its early heyday, it served as a sort of utopian ideal of public space in Canada. Filmmaker Ali Weinstein captures the sad end to that dream in a documentary that was shot during Ontario Place's final year of operations. By contrasting the experiences and perspectives of staff members and visitors with archival images of the park in happier and more hopeful times, her film invites viewers to ponder what was and what could've been. Thankfully, moments of wry and quirky humour continually alleviate the poignant tone.
